THERE IS A PLACE FOR EVERYONE IN SCOUTING



A Scout is a Scout, regardless of special accommodations they may require because of physical or mental limitations, said Midge Savage, Chairwoman of the Michigan Crossroads Council's Special Needs Committee.

"We all benefit when someone

succeeds," Savage said. "There is one young man who is 18-years-old. It is unlikely that earning Eagle is in his future, but he loves Scouting, reciting the pledge and he loves to be around the group. They wanted to make him assistant Scoutmaster and he has received registration beyond the age of eligibility and he continues to be part of that group's opening and closing. For him that's an important part of his life."

About two percent of Scouts registered with the MCC require registration beyond the age of eligibility and the more significant accommodations that may come with that to complete their advancement work. These are usually Scouts with very severe limitations that may prevent them from participating fully in meetings or fulfilling advancement requirements without a higher level of assistance.

"It needs to be pretty significant or pervasive," Savage said, "like a significant cognitive delay or a severe emotional impairment."

Whether they are eligible for beyond age of eligibility or have special needs, about 95 percent of Scouts are in units chartered by schools and churches.

Merit badges have to be done just as the requirements are written, but sometimes there are ways to make accommodations. The Scout may have to master it several times to get through it or may need to be questioned through multiple choice or "yes" or "no" questions or may have to accomplish the requirements by actually demonstrating what they're trying to do.

"A Scout can have mild learning disabilities and would be expected to participate through normal Scouting channels," Savage said. "For instance, a child who uses a text to talk computer,

but is getting A's and B's in school, would have a Merit Badge counselor who would use text to talk, but would not be a candidate for beyond the age of eligibility."

Other accommodations could include allowing a Scout on the autism spectrum who may not be able to sit through an entire meeting to come late or require a list of instructions to be broken up into pieces that are easier for them to manage. Sometimes they can't stand in a group and need to be in the front or the back and this is when, Savage said, the buddy system works well. She said these are small accommodations that can make a positive difference.

Some units also have found that it's helpful to have a quiet area which benefits everyone and not just Scouts with special needs.

"Accommodations can be made that are reasonable and still meet Scout standards and there's more that we can do," Savage said. "Everything is on a continuum. Good Scoutmasters have discovered that kids need rest time and

quiet time."

A key part of making the experience successful for Scouts with special needs is making sure leaders are comfortable working with a young man with special needs and parents have to be comfortable with the relationship between their child and those they will be interacting with.

Each Field Service Council is responsible for processing advancement beyond the age of eligibility. Savage's committee does trainings at Scouting University and Roundtables to ensure that every Scout gets the full benefit of Scouting.

The committee includes a psychologist, a therapist, and a social worker, in addition to Savage who is a retired director of Special Education professional. She also has been a long time Scouting volunteer wearing numerous hats.

Making these accommodations has met with resistance from some in Scouting, she said. Savage said one individual was upset that a young man had been approved for registration beyond the age of eligibility.

"This gentleman thought that we were weakening the Eagle and just giving it away. He had concerns about breaking it down into pieces," Savage said. "We explained that the requirements were being achieved in a segmented, slower way and by the time we were done with the committee meeting, they understood.

"The adults around us make it a bigger deal than it needs to be. Kids will bring their buddy along and they get it," Savage said. "We get caught up in rules and regulations and they just do it. It's a bond and if other Scouts take the time to respect an individual Scout, that respect leads to growth. Units that foster that have successful Scouts."

The bottom line for Savage and those on her committee is to make Scouting as accessible as possible so that every youth who wants to participate has that opportunity.

CHANCE'S TO GIVE BACK



Nate Chance said he is keeping his son's memory alive by giving to others. As Chance, his wife, Carrie, and two remaining children continue to mourn the loss of their son and brother, Malachi, they are finding opportunities to honor his memory through the establishment of a foundation named for Malachi and a recent Toy Drive at Sparrow Hospital.

"We want to keep his memory alive and still honor what he would have wanted to do," Nate said.

Malachi, a member of Cub Scout Pack 260, passed away on October 31, 2016, five days after he was struck by a vehicle while crossing a street in downtown Grand Ledge. He was 11-years-old at the time of his death. His brother, Zephan, who was 8 at the time, also suffered serious injuries, but has recovered.

On October 31 of this year, the Chance's observed the first anniversary of Malachi's death through a Toy Drive they organized at Sparrow Hospital. The family delivered dozens of toys, games, blankets and other items donated by community members to Sparrow's pediatrics playroom. Many of the items will become gifts for children admitted to the hospital.

"We're working on setting up a foundation in Malachi's name," Nate said. "We've done some small things where we had some things crocheted and gave them away in Malachi's name. We're planning on a cloth drive to be able to donate different materials to the Sparrow Foundation to make blankets and pillows for kids at the hospital."

Nate said he has been asked many times about where the strength comes from to organize these giving moments. He said a dedication to family and a focus on honoring his son's memory has a lot to do with it.

"It's just knowing who he was and the type of kid that he was," Nate said. "We, as a family, always try to look at the positive in everything. Malachi passed away and there's nothing we could do about it. We have to be forward-thinking about honoring his life the best that we can and we have two children who we need to be there for.

"We will develop a new sense of normal."

The Toy Drive and other giving opportunities have given Zephan, age 9, and sister, Miranda, age 7, time to talk about their brother with others which is helping them get through the loss of their brother.

In addition to his family's ability to take a tragedy and maintain optimism for the future, Nate said their Scouting family rallied around them and have been a great source of support at a difficult time.

"We've cried and taken a bad situation and tried to make it good," Nate says. "He was a very giving young man. He was always looking to help the next person."

Even in death that giving support shined when Malachi became a "Gift of Life" donor. However, the extent of his many acts of kindness were not known to his family until his death.

Classmates related stories to the Chance's about how Malachi would befriend those deemed "unfriendable." "He would go out of his way to help kids who were being bullied," Nate says. "He would tell me that they need a friend so why wouldn't I be a friend to them. There was a bov. who whenever Malachi would see him, he would always say hi to him and that was something we preached to the kids. We've told them that it makes people feel good that they were noticed."

In at least one memorable moment, Malachi's generosity came back to his family.

"He had \$1 and gave it to a classmate," Nate said. "She actually brought that \$1 back to help our family because of the impact that had on her.

"That's who he was. That's kind of his legacy of giving."

SAGINAW SCOUT LIVES WHAT HE'S LEARNING IN SCOUTING

Zachary "Zack" Mitchell's swift actions saved the life of a classmate who was planning to kill himself.

For his quick-thinking to avert a potential tragedy, Zack, a member of Troop 345 in Saginaw, was awarded the Medal of Merit from the Boy Scouts of America during a special presentation in May, four months after his classmate announced his intent to commit suicide on a live YouTube feed.

Zack, who is a 9th-grader at Swan Valley High School, was home alone doing his homework when he received a notification that YouTube was live.

"I clicked on the link to see what was going on," Zack said. "I saw my classmate saying that he was going to spend his last few minutes playing his favorite game. I was confused at first and then he stated that 'anybody just joining, I'm going to kill myself. I am very depressed."

After "freaking out" for a minute or two while trying to figure out how to handle what he just saw and heard, Zack said he emailed his classmate to try and calm him down and also to make sure he was O.K. At the same time, Zack called the principal of his school to let her know what was going on. When she didn't respond, he emailed her and called his parents.

"My mom and dad called 911 and my principal emailed me back to make sure I was O.K. and to let me know I was doing the right thing," Zack said.

About two hours later Zack learned that his classmate was O.K. and would be receiving help.

Dave Howe, Scoutmaster for Troop 345, said he was in awe about Zack's quick response.

"This is so much of what we hope they get out of being a Boy Scout. It made me so proud that I was his Scoutmaster," Howe said. "I knew right away that we had to do something to recognize Zack for this as a Scout going above and beyond what you'd think. He didn't even think that it was that big of a deal that he did it."

After doing some research Howe found the Medal of Merit which honors Scout, Venturers, and Scouters who have performed an act of meritorious service above and beyond what is normally expected of a youth or adult member of the Boy Scouts of America. Michael Hussar, Committee Chair for the Water and Woods Field Service Council, recommended Zack for the Medal of Merit "due to his willingness to get involved in what could have been an unhappy ending."

"I didn't know how to react at first and I was scared and then I just called because I knew that would be the right thing," Zack said. "It was kind of just instinct."

Tom Mitchell, Zack's father, said doing the right thing is something his son has grown up with. He said he doesn't think anyone else who was watching the YouTube stream that night stepped up to take action as his son did.

"Zack's always been a very sensitive and conscientious young man," Tom Mitchell said. "He's always concerned for others and is always making sure they're involved. He's very respectful and is a great example for other boys and the other Scouts in his troop."

Zack said his involvement in Scouting taught him to do the right thing and to be the best person that he can be. He joined as a Cub Scout in first grade and said he plans to stay involved because of the leadership and camping opportunities.

Tom Mitchell said he fully supports his son's decision to stay involved in Scouting.

"I think it's important for them to be involved in something," he said. "Scouting teaches them how to be good citizens and overall good human beings."

Howe said for many Scouts, doing the right becomes an automatic response. "You spend enough time in Scouting and start to follow Scouting values without even thinking about it," he said.

ALEX JOHNSON — YOU'RE NEVER TOO YOUNG TO PRACTICE BECOMING AN EAGLE SCOUT



During a Cub Scout camp at Camp Munhacke in July seven-year-old Alex Johnson, of Chief Okemos District Pack 121, discovered his very first ga-ga pit. And as luck would have it, Camp Munhacke had two, where Alex and his fellow Scouts could be found playing whenever they had time to spare.

Ga-ga ball is a fast-paced, high energy sport like dodge ball, that's played in an octagonal pit. The sport combines skills such as running, jumping, and dodging while trying to hit opponents below the knees with a soft foam ball.

Alex's dad, Derek Johnson said, "After talking with his Boy Scout Camp volunteer, Alex discovered that some Eagle Scouts across the country have built ga-ga pits for their Eagle Scout projects."

Alex's school, St. Gerard's in Lansing, did not have one, so he decided he wanted to build a ga-ga pit at his school.

His dad explained that it was a big project which required Alex to ask the permission of many people, including the Boy Scouts national office, to get approval for his idea to install a ga-ga pit. Determined to get the project done, Alex approached Corrie Groth, Chief Okemos District's Field Director and asked, "Can I build a ga-ga pit at my school for my Eagle Scout project?"

Corrie smiled and said, "You have to be a Boy Scout first, not a Cub Scout."

"I've never seen Alex look so heartbroken" his dad said, "although he instantly revived when Corrie told him, "However, you could get your pack involved and do it as a community service project."

"What's a community service project?" Alex asked.

Corrie explained, "It's like practice for an Eagle Scout project and you still get to build it."

With his Dad's help, Alex was up and running, researching how to build a ga-ga pit, find sponsors and organize the project over the next two months.

"Several sponsors were found, some who provided total costs, while others provided at their cost, or just charged freight expenses," Derek Johnson said. Some businesses were only open during school hours, so Alex could not be there, but, I had pictures and the story," he explained. The overall project which included items like lumber, limestone, sand, Astroturf, wood chips and other materials cost around \$5,000.

Local sponsors included JP Builders, MPC Cash-way Lumber, Hammond Farms Landscape Supply, Delta Floats, and Flat Rock Bagging. Professional volunteers included Dale Frank and Tim David who assisted with carpentry and AstroTurf Installation.

In addition to expenses, the project required many volunteer hours as well. Help came from boys in Alex's Wolf Den pack and their parents, as well as other Scouts from Tigers to Webelo's, family members, and even local Unit Service Executive Abel Rubio.

Derek Johnson said, "It took four working days and over 150 volunteer hours to complete what may be Michigan's first and only artificial grass ga-ga pit." The ga-ga pit was officially opened on October 10.

After the project was completed, Alex said, "I feel really good because everybody likes it and has fun in it."

"It was an important project for the school and the community, Wendy Johnson, Alex's mother, said. "I am proud of him. Alex never looks at anything and thinks he cannot do it. I love that what makes him happy is that he does things for other people to make them happy."

Earlier this year, Alex represented the Boy Scouts of America, Michigan Crossroads Council, at the State Capitol during Report to the State, and in 2016, he came in second as a top popcorn seller for the Chief Okemos District, and 5th in the State of Michigan.

This may have been practice, but from the results, it looks like Alex is on his way to someday fulfilling his goal of becoming an Eagle Scout.

DAVID-MICHAEL PETERSON — ALMOST AN EAGLE



It took David-Michael Peterson two years to take his Eagle Scout project from concept to reality, but he says the wait was worth it.

During a ceremony on October 13, the Disc Golf Course he created at Holt High School was dedicated. The project cost \$5,000 to complete.

"Raising the funds to pay for the equipment and signage were the most challenging obstacles to overcome," he said. David-Michael began asking local businesses for sponsorships from the time he was 14 years old. "I made over 30 requests, and got a lot of "no's," he said, "however, the first Gold sponsorship for \$500.00 I secured really motivated me to keep going."

In addition to equipment and signage, the money raised was used to purchase discs and a curriculum for the Physical Education instructors at Holt High School to use in the classroom.

David-Michael's dad, David Peterson, who is an engineer, mentored David on the structural design and logistical knowledge needed to plan and build the course.

It is rare for someone who just turned 16 a few months ago to raise such a large amount of money for a project, but his mother Heather Peterson said he was determined to reach his goal.

"It was both a family and community effort," she said. "His troop has been very supportive along the way. It really does take a village."

David-Michael is a member of the Chief Okemos District, Troop 43 in Dimondale.

The project required hands-on help and support from many family, friends and troop members to complete. David-Michael said they volunteered a total of 500 volunteer hours.

Planning, organizing, recruiting volunteers and raising funds taught him about how to manage, not just a project, but people as well.

"I had to learn how to give directions and tell others what to do, "he said. He also learned how to get up in front of 30 or more people at a time and take control. "I learned a lot about time management and being a leader.

It really has prepared me for life. From camping to people skills, every single aspect of life is covered and this is one of the greatest parts about Scouting. " David-Michael and his dad are avid disc golfers who have played in tournaments and on courses in North Dakota, North Carolina and Nevada.

"Not many youths know about disc golf," David-Michael said.

He feels his project will open a new door for students and get people connected through the sport. The Disc Golf Course will not only benefit students at Holt High School and be part of their Physical Education curriculum, but will also be open to the public.

David-Michael began his Scouting journey in kindergarten. He has accumulated many favorite memories, but the best one was taking a 100-mile canoe trip with his troop.

"This past summer my troop canoed the Fox and Manistique rivers in Michigan's Upper Peninsula. We traveled about 20 miles per day. One day we paddled for 12 hours," he said. David-Michael offered some advice for younger Scouts. "One thing I would like to tell younger Scouts who aspire to the rank of Eagle is to work on one task at a time."

When he was younger, he set small goals in order to complete all of the merit badges that he would someday need to become an Eagle Scout. He advises younger Scouts to bring their book with them to each meeting and have one or two tasks signed off on to help them stay motivated.

David and Heather Peterson are overwhelmingly proud of their son for what he's accomplished.

"We need leaders that know how to set goals and accomplish them," his dad said. "We need leaders that can communicate."

Although he still must submit the paperwork and prepare for his Eagle Board of Review, David-Michael Peterson is already one of those leaders.

SOUTH HAVEN CUB SCOUT SELECTED AS REPORT TO NATION DELEGATE



When a national delegation of Boy Scouts travels to Washington, D.C. to present their Report to the Nation, an 8-year-old Cub Scout from South Haven will be with them.

Donnell Thomas, a member of Pack #188, was selected from thousands of Scouts who applied to be a part of the delegation that will present an update on the state of Scouting to the speaker of the United States House of **Representatives.** Known as the Report to the Nation, the presentation focuses on who the Bov Scouts of America is; programs and initiatives supported by the BSA; and major accomplishments and contributions the organization has made during the past year.

The delegation includes between six and 10 Scouts.

On a recent Saturday during a visit to the Scout Shop in Kalamazoo, Donnell appeared to be taking his delegatestatus in stride.

"I'm excited to go and see the White House and the Pentagon where my grandma worked," Donnell said.

Equally as excited are Donnell's grandparents Pastor Jeff and Lynn Dick. Pastor Dick ministers at the First Congregational Church which charters his grandson's Pack and a Boy Scout Troop. He is also the Scoutmaster for Donnell's Pack and nominated his grandson for inclusion in the delegation.

While scrolling through emails, Dick said he saw one about the Report to the Nation.

"I had never heard of it. It was just mind-boggling and I thought of Donnell," Dick said. "Here's a young man who's moved around a lot and doesn't get opportunities like this and I thought why not give it to someone who really deserves it. "

Dick wrote a letter of recommendation to the nominating committee thinking that perhaps his grandson would get a mention for being nominated. When the telephone call came from the BSA's National office letting him know that Donnell had been selected, Dick said he was surprised and beyond thrilled.

"I'm ecstatic about this opportunity for him to be able to go to Washington and see all these places and meet these people and also spend time with older Scouts," he said.

The recommendation letter was an honest representation of Donnell's ability to overcome challenges at a very young age.

"I told them that this is a young

boy who has had virtually no contact with his birth father and really doesn't know him," Dick said. "I wrote about the importance of Scouting in his life and the maturity he showed at camp this summer which was tremendous."

During a camping trip this summer to Rota Kiwan Scout Reservation, Donnell, a non-swimmer, passed a swimming test and was able to swim without assistance to a large, inflatable platform on Eagle Lake.

While this may not seem to many people to be a major accomplishment, it is for Donnell and his family.

The Dick's adopted Donnell's two uncles when they were young and adopted his mother, Keyana, after his birth.

"We developed a relationship with Keyana when she was a teenager living in a children's home in Kalamazoo," Dick said. "She was always calling us 'mom' and 'dad.' We adopted her and she moved to South Haven."

The adoption made the Dick's Donnell's legal grandparents, and also gave them the ability to be there for Keyana if she needed medical care or required hospitalization. In addition to Donnell, she has a daughter, Raziyah, age 5, and a son, Josiah, age 3. Donnell, his mother, and siblings currently live in Chicago, but are planning to move back to Michigan next year.

"We see Donnell every weekend at this point. On Sunday, there's usually a Den meeting and Pack meeting we're going to," Dick said. "His mom and the other kids come up once a month to see us. We try to time weekend events for mom to come up when Scout things are going on."

Dick got Donnell involved in Scouting two years ago after seeing the positive impact it made on his two older sons. The family's initial involvement with Scouting began after the family moved to South Haven 25 years ago. Their son, Josh, now 30, earned his First Class rank and younger son, Brandon, earned his Life rank.

Dick said Scouting was something he could do with his sons and gave them opportunities to camp and participate in activities they might not have otherwise had the opportunity to do. He said his sons learned the importance of friendship and the value of loyalty and community service and continue to live what they learned as Scouts.

Dick has stayed involved because the need for Scouting in the lives of the young people he sees has never been more critical. He said there are a lot more boys who are being raised by a single mom or a grandparent.

"As I was entering names into the database, I was noticing that there were a number of boys who had different last names than their parents," Dick said. "I became aware of just how important an organization like Scouting is because it puts them in touch with adults and good role models.

"When Josh joined the Cub Scouts there was one single mom and the rest were from two-parent homes. Now, there may be 18 boys and eight of them may be in two-parent homes. It takes a toll on the kids."

The community's recognition

of the value of Scouting has enabled Dick to double the size of the Pack, which now has 85 youth, and also increase the size of the Troop to 20. A total of 70 new Scouts were registered this year under his leadership.



But, more important to Dick than the numbers is the diversity of the Pack and Troop and their ability to respect and support one another.

"We have white, black, and Hispanic youth mixing together on a regular basis," he said. "This is hugely important for them because many of them come from homes with couples who aren't married and are significantly low-income." Despite their family circumstances, four Scouts are working on their Eagle Scout, including one young man who has raised \$4,000 to purchase two AED machines that will be given to the Bangor and South Haven public libraries as his Eagle project.

These older Scouts are the role models for their younger counterparts.

"You want them to see young men that are not that different from them doing great things," Dick said. "It's important for them to be able to look up to these boys as examples and role models."

The chartering process is one of the oldest traditions in Scouting. It is the formal document that certifies the agreement between a Chartered Partner – an organization that agrees to utilize Scouting as a part of its service to youth and community outreach – and the Boy Scouts of America, setting expectations for the quality of program to be delivered to the Charter Partner's youth population. The BSA grants charters to sponsoring (chartered) organizations who must report to Scouting annually to renew their local charters. Rechartering is the process where a Scout unit renews its charter as an official part of the Boy Scouts of America.
