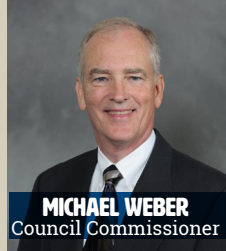
★ MESSAGE FROM THE KEY 3 ★

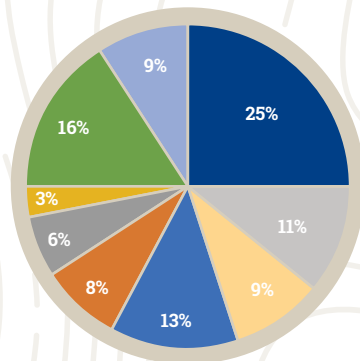

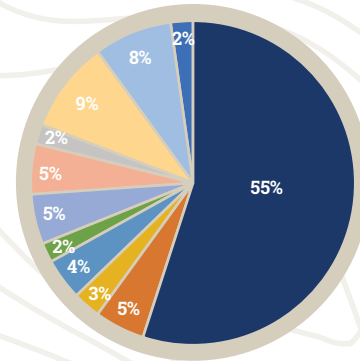
