Lets talk a little about Coins


There are specific parts to the make up of a coin There is the outer surface, which can have lettering, reeding, or designs on it, This is called the edge. Near the edge is the raised area called the rim. Both sides of most coins feature designs and artwork, often including an image of a person Which is known as a bust.

The blank area of background on a coin is called the field.

The term relief refers to the depth of the markings on the coin and how much they are raised above the field.

Small letters show where the coin was minted, known as the mint mark, and the initials of the sculptor or artist who designed and/or sculpted the coin.

Other writing on a coin includes the date and the inscription.





Lets talk a little about Where are coins made

Each of these location are called a facility

Starting on the West Coast

The first Facility is the San Francisco Mint Facility

This facility makes commemorative coins, proof coins, and coin dies.

Moving East The second facility is the Denver Mint Facility At Denver they make circulating and commemorative coins, uncirculated coin sets, coin dies, and stores gold and silver. The Denver Mint also offers public tours.

Next, is the Fort Knox Bullion Depository First opened to store gold, the U.S. Bullion Depository makes no coins.

Next is the Washington, DC Headquarters

The headquarters of the Mint is in Washington, DC. Though this facility does not make coins, it is responsible for coin laws, research, marketing, and other important business related to the Mint's operations.

Next is Philadelphia Mint Facility This was the home of the first U.S. Mint Its original building was the first federal building under the Constitution! This facility makes circulating and commemorative coins, uncirculated coin sets, medals, and coin and medal dies. They also offers public tours.

And lastly is West Point Mint Facility This facility makes commemorative coins, American Eagle proof and uncirculated bullion coins in gold, silver, and platinum.

Now that we know a little more about coins and where they are made. Lets watch a short clip on How Coins Are Made....check it out

The Mint makes many coins and medals, but they are not all worth the same.

Lets talk about the coins that we make the most and details about their value, composition, weight, diameter, and thickness.

Penny Valued at one cent Made of Copper Plated Zinc Weighs 2.5 grams .75 inch's in diameter And holds a thickness of 1.52 millimeters

Nickel Valued at five cents Made of Nickel Weighs 5 grams .835 inch's in diameter And holds a thickness of 1.95 millimeters


Dime Valued at ten cents Also made of Nickel Weighs 2.268 grams .705 inch's in diameter And holds a thickness of 1.35 millimeters

Lastly the Quarter Valued at twenty-five cents Also made of Nickel Weighs 5.67 grams .955 inch's in diameter And holds a thickness of 1.75 millimeters

Every coin in your pocket was made in the United States by one of the Mint's facilities.


Duct-Tape Ruler And Scissors

If you haven't found them please do so now.

Scout, pay close attention We are going to share a short clip On how to make a Duct-Tape Wallet....check it out

Everyone have their materials? If so, we can get started (Depending on the group, either wait a couple minutes for Parents to collect items or proceed with the project)

First


We are going to cut four strips of duct-tape

(Click) With each being 9 inches long

(Click) Make sure the sticky side is up

(Click) Stick the strips to one another Making sure they overlap about a quarter of an inch (Click)






Next

Make another sheet Of four strips Nine inches long (Click)

Stick the two sheets together (Click)

Cut another nine inch strip of tape (Click)


With the nine in strip Cut a small slit in the center of one of the ends (Click)



Next Tear the nine inch strip Right down the center Using the small cut you made to help Separate the duct-tape into two pieces (Click)

Now we are going to take our Two strips and place them on The long edge of each piece

Making a clean edge on each side of our sheet Of duct-tape (Click)




Now that we have a smooth edge (Click)

Trim each side of your sheet Making sure it ends up being Eight and a half inches long (Click)

Now fold your sheet in half (Click)

Next Cut another piece of tape Four inches in length And like we did before We are going to cut a small slit In the middle of this (Click)






Now tear that four inch piece in half (Click)

On your folded sheet Apply a strip to each end Now we have the main piece for keeping our bills (Click)

Trim off the excess on all four corners (Click)

Next we are going to make a pocket Cut two strips at five inches long






Stick the two five inch pieces together (Click)

Next cut another five inch strip And lets make another protective edge for our pocket (Click)

Apply the strip to each long edge of the five inch pocket we made (Click)

Now, using the ruler lets trim our finished pocket down to approximately four inches






Once you have your pocket trimmed (Click)

We can cut another five inch strip And similar to before Cut a slit in the center of the five inch strip (Click)

Tear the strip in half (Click)

And apply it to our pocket Holding our pocket in place on either end of your wallet





Repeat this step for the other side (Click)


And let now trim off the excess tape (Click)

Next Cut another four inch strip And apply it to the bottom of your pocket (Click)

Fold the piece over onto the other side and trim off the excess tape

This completes the pocket and allows us to put cards or other items in it without anything falling through




