CUB SCOUTING

While Cub Scouting is designed for boys and girls in kindergarten through fifth grade, it really involves the whole family as parents pitch in to plan and deliver activities. Cub Scouting helps form a foundation of character in ways that are affirmative and fun.

SCOUTS BSA

This experience is for young men and women in fifth grade through high school.

In Scouting, leadership is learned through adventure, both in the great outdoors and in our communities. In Scouting, young people learn leadership by putting the principles of Scouting into practice every day. In this time-tested program, youth lead their own activities and work their way toward earning Scouting's highest rank, Eagle Scout.

VENTURING

Venturing is a coed program for young adults ages 13 (and have completed the 8th grade) through 20 that focuses on adventure, leadership, personal growth, and service. Venturing's motto, "Lead the Adventure," reminds Venturers to always pursue life in the spirit of adventure.

Venturing crews are youth-led and adult-advised. Crews can have specialty interests, and youth can work on Venturing awards while also continuing to work toward Scouting's highest rank, Eagle Scout.

SEA SCOUTING

Sea Scouting is adventure in, on, around, and under water. Sea Scout ships are high adventure on oceans, rivers, and lakes. They provide limitless opportunities and exciting challenges that you won't find anywhere else. Sea Scouting is a place to grow and learn, find adventure, and build long-lasting friendships.

BOYS, GIRLS, OR BOTH? IT'S THE CHARTERED ORGANIZATION'S CHOICE


CUB SCOUTS

A chartered organization may form an all-boy pack, an all-girl pack, or have a pack with all-boy and all-girl dens.

Troops serve either all boys or all girls. A chartered organization may have multiple troops—for instance, a troop that serves all girls, and a troop that serves boys—that share a troop committee. This model ensures the single gender experience and leadership opportunities for girls and boys alike.
