



Ron Bieber has devoted his entire career to fighting for working families.

He was elected president of the Michigan AFL-CIO on June 3, 2015. In May of 2019, he was reelected to serve his second four-year term, and in September of 2023, he was reelected for his third term.

Bieber joined UAW local 730 in 1978 after being hired into the General Motors Metal Fabricating plant in Wyoming, Michigan. He was elected to his first union position at the age of 23 and moved up the ranks, being appointed to the UAW International staff in 1992.

In 2009, Bieber was promoted to Administrative Assistant to the UAW President and named the Director of the UAW CAP Department. In this position, his responsibilities included the administration of the Political, Retired Workers, and Civil Rights departments of the UAW.

Bieber currently serves on the boards of the Economic Alliance of Michigan, the Michigan Association of United Ways, and the Metropolitan Affairs Coalition.

Eric joined the Laborers Union in April 2006 and was elected Sergeant at Arms in 2007. In 2012, he was elected Recording Secretary and was reelected in 2015, 2018, and 2021.

A Scouter for 30+ years, Eric obtained Eagle in 1999. He serves in many capacities as a Scoutmaster, Treasurer, National Camp Accreditation Team Lead, several committees such as the National Jamboree and district activities. He most recently led a Wood Badge Course as the Course Director; truly embodying servant leadership and exemplifying the ideals of the Scout Oath and Law. Travis Babcock is a dedicated leader in Scouting, public safety, and community service. As Scoutmaster of Troop 14 in Spring Lake, Michigan, he mentors young people, ensuring the troop's legacy of leadership and civic responsibility. He also serves as a district-wide American Labor Merit Badge Counselor, educating Scouts on labor history and work ethics. Travis has received the Silver Beaver, Vigil Honor, District Award of Merit, and Honored Eagle Scout Award for his service to Scouting.

Beyond Scouting, Travis is spearheading a new public safety Explorer post with the Ottawa County Sheriff's Department, offering hands-on experience to young adults. In his two decades with the Police Officers Labor Council, he has served as a Union Board Trustee and Benevolence Chair, advocating for fellow officers and strengthening union outreach.

A dedicated sheriff's deputy, firefighter, and EMT with the Spring Lake Fire Department, Travis plays a vital role in public safety and serves on membership and retention committees. 

Harold was a dedicated Union Member for over 46 years, working as a driver in Hilo and later as an Industrial Electrician. Although he never held an office in the Teamsters or the AFL-CIO, he was a loyal dues-paying member. He fulfilled his responsibilities while supporting J.L. Hudson and the Ford Motor Company UAW Local 600. Harold worked at Ford for more than 41 years, retiring in 2012.

While he didn't establish new scout units, he actively participated in existing ones in northwest Detroit during the 1950s and 1960s. He attended Scout-O-Rama programs and visited the Howell Nature Center. As a father, he supported his son through the Cub Scout ranks and led a den of 16 youth. His involvement continued in Troop 1104, where he was part of the Troop Committee, ensuring the boys met their advancement requirements.

Harold was a Cub and Boy Scout himself, with his mother serving as Den Leader and his father as Commissioner. He was also a parent in the program for his son John, taking on roles as Den Leader and Troop Committee Member for many years, even after John achieved Eagle Scout. He participated in BSA Commissioner College sessions at Western Michigan University and later became the Unit Commissioner for Pack 1116. In 2021, he served as the active Unit Commissioner for Troop 1151, where he proudly supported the promotion of three Eagles.


Harold passed away on December 24, 2024, at the age of 76.



Jason Cousino has built a distinguished career in the unionized workforce, beginning in 1990 with Boilermakers Local 85 at the Toledo Shipyard as a Welder. From 1991 to 2001, he worked as a Millwright and Certified Welder at the Detroit Waste Energy Power Plant with Operating Engineers Local 547, also serving as a member of the Union Safety Committee. Since 2001, he has been employed with DTE and the Utility Workers Union of America Local 223 in Detroit, where he has held various roles, including Union Safety Steward (2 years), Union Field Safety Specialist (14 years), and Local Safety Facilitator (8 years). Additionally, he has served as Wildlife Habitat Coordinator for 20 years in a volunteer capacity, as well as Local and Divisional Election Chair for over 12 years. He has represented the Local at high school career talks, promoting unions, trades, and safety, and has coordinated the donation of welding supplies and materials to local schools and Boy Scouts of America camps. Jason has also contributed by teaching the Labor Merit Badge at summer camp when needed.

In Scouting, Jason began his journey in the late 1970s with Cub Scouts Pack 217 in Jerusalem Township, Ohio, earning his Webelos and Arrow of Light. He later transitioned into Boy Scouts Troop 131, where his father served as Scoutmaster. In 1990, he achieved the rank of Eagle Scout. In 2019, Jason's son, Chase, joined Troop 508 in Carleton, where Jason became an Assistant Scoutmaster. Proud of his son's Eagle Scout achievement in 2021, Jason later took on the role of Scoutmaster, a position he still holds today. Jason and his son have had memorable adventures together, including visits to The Summit and Philmont Scout Ranch, where they completed a two-week hiking expedition and climbed Mt. Baldy at 12,441 feet.





WHAT IS EXPLORING**

xploring is Learning for Life's career education program for young men and women in sixth grade through 20 years old. Adults are selected by the participating organization for involvement in the program. Clubs are for sixth- through eighth-graders. While these groups are often "general interest" and introduce youth to a variety of different career fields, they could also be focused on a single career. Posts, for 14- through 20-year-olds, are the opposite. Most often they focus on a single career field, but they could also be "general careers."

Exploring's purpose is to provide experiences to help young people mature and to prepare them to become responsible and caring adults. Exploring is based on a unique and dynamic relationship between youth and the organizations in their communities. Local community organizations initiate an Exploring program by matching their people and program resources to the interests of young people in the community. The result is a program of activities that helps youth grow, develop, and pursue their special interests. Exploring programs specialize in a variety of career skills.

WHAT DOES A TYPICAL

EXPLORING** PROGRAM LOOK LIKE?

- Each program sets its own meeting schedule. Your program schedule is
 flexible and should be based on the availability and resources of your
 organization and your youth participants. For example, instead of
 meeting twice each month, you might elect to have an intensive
 eight-week program.
- The **national average** of youth membership in a single Exploring program is 24 participants. The minimum number of participants required is five.
- Exploring is not Exploring unless it is a hands-on, interactive program.
 Job shadowing and facility tours are certainly a part of the program,
 but they should not be the focus of your program.
- Work with youth leadership to coordinate an annual "superactivity" like attending a national Exploring event, planning an overnight trip, or coordinating a community event.
- Some participating organizations choose to charge a program fee in addition to the annual registration fee to subsidize the cost of program materials, T-shirts or uniforms, or snacks and beverages at each meeting.
- Having a minimum of six registered adult leaders is recommended.
 The minimum requirements are four for posts and two for clubs.
- Host an open house (youth recruitment night) annually in the fall.

WORKFORCE SOLUTIONS*

The U.S. Chamber of Commerce Foundation has identified two main approaches that companies are using to forge new and customized pathways of developing young talent: (1) creating specific internal programs and (2) partnering with strategic nonprofits and external organizations. Additionally, they distilled five "essential elements" that can help more employers create powerful youth talent pipelines.

- MEASURE AND CONTINUOUSLY IMPROVE YOUR YOUTH EMPLOYMENT STRATEGY Exploring partners with organizations that provide this type of research.

Nominate a George Meany candidate from your local labor council

The George Meany Award is a national recognition approved by the AFL-CIO Executive Council. It may be presented to any adult union member who has made a significant contribution to the youth of their community through Scouting. Each AFL-CIO city central labor council and each AFL-CIO state federation is permitted to give one award annually. The emphasis of this award is on the importance of being selective. There is no rule that the quota must be used every year. No honorary recognitions should be made. The purpose of this award is to recognize the recipient's outstanding service to youth through the programs of Scouting America.

The Significance of the George Meany Award

It is estimated that one out of every four top unit leaders of Cub Scout packs, Scout troops, and Venturing crews in the United States is a union member. That's a lot of union Scout leaders. Thousands of other union members serve youth through Scouting America in local districts and councils, and on the regional and national levels. In recognition of their contributions to America's future, the AFL-CIO Executive Council established the George Meany Award. It recognizes union members who have made a significant contribution to the youth of their communities by volunteering in the programs of Scouting America. The award is named for the AFL-CIO's first president, who gave strong support to Scouting over the years. The award, a recognition approved by the national AFL-CIO Executive Council, gives organized labor an opportunity to recognize members for their service to youth, and also makes the public aware of the important role union members play in the community.

The Application and Selection

* George Meany Awards may be presented annually by each AFL-CIO central labor council and by each AFLCIO state federation. The central labor council will select its own recipients. The state federation may also have a George Meany Award program; their application process is the same, but their program and selection is separate from that of the central labor council. Applications may be obtained from your AFL-CIO central labor council, state federation, your area's AFLCIO Community Services liaison, from your Scouting America local council, or from www.scouting.org/awards_central.





Qualification Guidelines

The central labor council or state federation may develop its own standards for judging, but will consider such factors as the nominee's record in

- Promoting and expanding the use of the American Labor merit badge.
- Recruiting youth to earn the American Labor merit badge.
- Forming Scouting units, especially those to be operated by local unions or other labor groups.
- Recruiting union members to become Scout leaders, especially to become American Labor merit badge counselors and to be involved in units operated by union organizations.
- Contributing to Scouting in the field of labor relationships, and bringing the Scouting and labor movements together to serve the community.
- Taking Scouter training and setting a good example for youth.
- Promoting Scouting for all youth, regardless of race, creed, or disabling condition.

Although a nominee's length of service in Scouting may be considered, no specific number of years should be required. A person's record of accomplishment and dedication should weigh more heavily than longevity.

Recommended Selection Procedures

The central labor council invites all local unions to submit their candidates for the award. Any person, group, affiliated council, or local union may nominate a Scouter/member for the George Meany Award. The nominees may be submitted through their local unions or directly to the labor council. In any event, they must have the local union's recommendation as well as the Scouting America council certification.

The central labor council makes the final selection of its recipients from the candidates submitted. The selections and approvals are normally the responsibility of the Community Services Committee of the central labor council in conjunction with the Executive Board.



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
